Families Come First at Texas Health Plano

Texas Health Allen: Bringing Stroke Treatment Closer to Home



When Karen had a stroke in March of 2022, she was thankful her daughter asked the paramedics to send her to Texas Health Allen. "When I arrived Allen, I immediately felt safe. The staff was so caring, and I felt reassured right from the beginning that I was at the right place."

Karen's daughter, Kelly, said, "It was a scary time, but I felt fortunate because just weeks before my mom had a stroke, I was on a call with a number of people, one of whom was Jared Shelton, the former president of Texas Health Allen. When asked, 'What sets your hospital apart from the others?' he replied, 'It's our stroke center. If you are going to have a stroke, Texas Health Allen is where you need to be."

John and Leahray Wroten, long-time supporters of the Foundation and the North Texas community, provided the lead gift to kick off the pursuit of Primary Stroke Center certification. In 2022, we also launched the new Starlight Gala to support this endeavor, with support from Austin Commercial, H-E-B, First Horizon Bank, and the Tucker David Foundation.

THRIVE Expands to Provide a Better Future for Community Youth




Thanks to the generous support from donors and the community, the THRIVE (*Together Harnessing Resources to give Individuals Voices and Empowerment*) program will provide its services to students in five North Texas Schools by the end of 2023.

Currently operating in Sanger and Lewisville ISDs, this unique program is designed to combat food insecurity and promote the emotional well-being and long-term academic success for low-income, underserved students.

Peter is one of those students. He had a tough start in life and bounced between parents with substance abuse disorders. He entered the foster system and was eventually placed with his grandmother. He came to Sanger ISD a very angry and hurt child, but caring mentors were determined to give Peter a loving home and the support at

school he needed to turn his life around.

Soon, he was identified and enrolled in the THRIVE program where he learned valuable resiliency and life skills. Peter began working in the student-run grocery store at Linda Tutt High School (an important component of the THRIVE Program). Later, he was hired by a large grocery store where he could build his skills and earn his own money. Peter's life journey has been changed, and so can those of other at-risk students.



Wellness for Life[®] Saves Lives

Shanda Mayberry has been a nurse for more than 22 years. As a busy working mother, it was hard to find time for routine health check-ups, always having reasons to put off making an appointment for an annual exam.

Fortunately, Shanda made time to take part in a Wellness for Life breast cancer screening. During the routine screening and mammogram, abnormalities were found. After biopsy and testing, Shanda heard the dreaded words that she indeed had breast cancer.

Shanda believes, "By supporting this initiative, you not only impact the lives of the women who receive care, but also the lives of their loved ones and friends within the community. Cancer is a deadly disease that does not discriminate based on race, culture, or economic status."



Shanda is happy to be cancer-free these days and is now part of the

Wellness for Life host committee, helping to raise funds to support the program. "I am so grateful for this program that brought the mobile unit right to my doorstep and allowed for me to be diagnosed early. Not only was it convenient but a great experience because they provided exceptional care," said Shanda.

Health to Home Program Brings Hope and Healing



Allen, pictured above, went from being a world traveler to sleeping on a small mattress under U-Haul blankets on the streets of east Dallas. Following the death of his parents, he found solace in alcohol and was eventually evicted, calling the streets of Dallas home for about a year.

An infection in both feet left the 54-year-old Dallas native hospitalized for two weeks with sepsis, but thanks to the newly established Texas Health medical respite program, Health to Home, Allen was able to recover. Health to Home offers clinical oversight and



a safe place for recuperation to adults experiencing homelessness who, upon discharge from a hospital setting, are at higher risk of poor health outcomes due to living on the streets.

Allen, and others like him, are alive today because of the generous donations that have helped fund this program.

our THRIVE Program, food will be provided for three of our first THRIVE locations. That means children and their families will eat every day instead of going hungry, something many of us take for granted. And they supported their own hospitals, donating to their hospitals' 365 Funds where their dollars make the difference close to home.

Texas Health employee Dorothy told us, "I think when the universe blesses you with gifts of a good job, great coworkers, and financial stability, you need to give back. My donation goes to the Seay Behavioral Health Center because mental health disorders have been misunderstood and neglected for too long. I am happy to be part of lifting the stigma."

Celebrating Decades of Dedication and Support



Bill and Janeen Lamkin have supported the Texas Health Resources Foundation for nearly 25 years. During that time, the gifts they've provided and the number of volunteer positions they have served demonstrate their dedication to the health of the people of Fort Worth.

Bill and Janeen say they always drifted toward supporting the medical community because they understood firsthand how critical it is to have competent, advanced healthcare in the growing community of Fort Worth.

"We wanted to support a hospital organization that provides the biggest bang for your buck. I feel like if you give \$1 to Texas Health Resources, you get back \$2 in results. The studious way they invest in technology and services provides tremendous impact to our community," said Bill. For example, Texas Health Fort Worth handles more stroke victims than any other hospital in the state of Texas – including Houston.

The couple's relationship with Texas Health began when Janeen was treated for cancer at Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth in the early 2000s. At that time, Janeen was asked by Laura McWhorter (now Foundation President) to serve on the Kupferle Health Board and went on to serve on the Puttin' on the Pink Fashion Luncheon committee, and eventually became the Kupferle Health Board Chair.

Bill currently serves on the Texas Health Finance Committee and previously served on the Justin Tower Steering Committee, Harris Methodist Health Foundation Board, where he chaired the finance committee, Community Impact Board, and Chairman of the Texas Health Resources Foundation Board.

The Lamkins are part of the Hawthorne, Farrington-Thompson and Circle of Giving societies. The Texas Health Resources Foundation is profoundly grateful for their loyalty and unwavering support.

Couple's Honorary Gift Makes a Lasting Impact



In April 2022, the opening of the new Justin Tower at Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth made big news and the community responded with generous support for the new world-class medical center in Fort Worth.

Rusty Reid, President/CEO of Higginbotham Insurance, and his wife, Molly, were among those who toured the new facility, led by their friend Dr. Terence McCarthy, M.D., who is Medical Director of the ER and Chief of Staff at the hospital.

Impressed by the medical innovations at Justin Tower, Molly suggested that they do something special to honor Dr. McCarthy, a long-time pillar of the medical community in Fort Worth. After connecting with the Texas Health Resources Foundation, they decided to make a generous donation to the Justin Tower project and named the beautiful new nursing station after him.

Friends and Family

The Reid and McCarthy families became connected through their children who attended school together growing up in Fort Worth. "Terry is such a selfless guy. He has been there for our family whenever we needed him, always following up afterwards to make sure we were okay," said Molly. "The hospital has been the site of so many happy moments for our family, like the birth of our children -- and some not so bright moments when someone needed emergency medical care. We wanted to honor him for his unwavering commitment. Not just to our family -- but to the entire North Texas community."

In addition to being Chief of Staff, Dr. McCarthy plays an instrumental role in shaping the future of emergency care by serving as the Chair of Emergency Medicine at the TCU Burnett Medical School. The overarching goal of the school is to raise empathetic scholars by teaching them effective communication skills to deliver quality, patient-centered care.

"Terry's devotion to our community and to the future of medicine in North Texas reflects the quality of health care our community can expect and receive at Texas Health Harris Methodist hospital," said Rusty.

Family Committed to Enriching Lives in North Texas

The De Leon family of Dallas has made a tremendous impact on the North Texas community through their generous work with the Foundation over the last 10 years.

"Any time we can closely impact recipients who are in need of educational and medical resources, we like to affiliate with them," says Fernando, who is the Founder and CEO of Leon Capital Group, an investment firm.



As a top business leader in Dallas, Fernando says it's important to invest in the health of the community where employees live and work. "Business people want a healthy workforce where everyone can have access to competent medical care. It shouldn't be disproportionate," he said. THRIVE stands for Together Harnessing Resources to Give Individuals Voice and Empowerment, and it is dedicated to improving the lives of underserved students in our community. The program began in Sanger ISD in 2021 where at-risk students received resiliency training, counseling and low cost or free medical and mental health care. As well as being a Foundation board member, Patricia serves on the THRIVE Advisory Committee in Dallas and is passionate about the program and the impact it makes on North Texas students.

"THRIVE allows children access to a program that helps them develop healthy skill sets to become productive, civic-minded individuals. It requires a tremendous amount of community partnerships to lift these at-risk students. It's a program that takes a village, and I'm excited to be part of the future expansion of THRIVE into DISD and other school districts in Texas."

The De Leons have four children who are getting their own education in philanthropy through lively discussions around the dinner table, says Patricia. "We discuss how we want to spend our time and resources over dinner and ask the children to share their thoughts with us. It's part of our parenting philosophy in the hopes they adopt the mindset of giving back and caring about our community."

George Ann Carter Bahan



George Ann Brown Carter Bahan died peacefully at home on September 7, 2022, surrounded by her family. She was 95.

George Ann graduated from R. L. Pascal High School in 1943. She attended Mary Baldwin College in Virginia for one year before transferring to and graduating from the University of Texas in Austin. She was a Steeplechase Debutante in 1948.

After returning to Fort Worth, George Ann met her future husband, Amon Carter Jr., at a party. They married in 1953 and remained happily together until his death in 1982.

The second chapter of her life began in 2001 when she married William C. Bahan, also a widower. They were happily married until his death in 2020. George Ann was very involved in her community. She was a past president of Casa Manana, Jewel Charity Ball, the Junior League of Fort Worth, and the Assembly. In addition, she was a founding member of Fort Worth Country Day School and was thrilled to receive an Honorary Doctorate from Texas Wesleyan University.

George Ann was a long-time supporter of Texas Health Fort Worth. In 2001, she made a lead gift to the hospital in honor of her mother Mrs. Eulema Riley Brown.

Joyce Pate Capper




Joyce Pate Capper died January 4, 2022, at 90 years old. Joyce was born in Italy, Texas, to Ray and Jewel Peugh in 1932. She graduated from Polytechnic High School and attended Texas Christian University. In 1963, she met and married A.M. "Aggie" Pate who owned Texas Refinery Corp. She and Aggie enjoyed 25 years together until his death in 1988. They traveled the world and delighted in entertaining, especially at the Pate Museum.

On October 31, 1991, she married Dr. Robert Capper. They spent 30 years together. Joyce gave herself to volunteer work, joining the Junior League and serving as president of the Fort Worth Garden Club and the Jewel Charity Ball. In 1974, she received the Fort Worth Woman of the Year Award. Joyce was on the board of both the Texas Girls' Choir and the Fort Worth Historical Society.

She also served as a docent for the Kimbell Art Museum for 25 years. It was her honor to be appointed Honorary Consul to Luxembourg in 1992. She served with the Fort Worth Heart Association and was an active participant in Go Red for Women. Joyce was a member of the Texas Christian University Library Association and received an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Texas Wesleyan University.

Dr. and Mrs. Capper provided incredibly generous support to the Texas Health Fort Worth Heart Center and funded the Joyce Pate Capper Heart Symposium for many years.

Jerry started his business career with a subsidiary of the Texas Utilities Company in 1957 as a customer service representative. During his time with Texas Utilities he worked in operations, finance, investor relations, and a variety of executive roles. Jerry's involvement in healthcare was extensive. He served as a trustee of

Isabell Salloum Haggar passed away on June 12, 2022. She was 92 years old.


