## **Healthcare and Support Services** for Denton County Residents **Experiencing Homelessness**

#### **About this Grant**

The collaboration between Health Services of North Texas (HSNT) and Our Daily Bread (ODB) will connect people in Denton County who are experiencing homelessness with primary medical care and support services. This grant will enable HSNT to hire a licensed vocational nurse (LVN) to be stationed at the ODB site two days per week to provide basic first aid, health education, immunizations, and intake screening to determine the need for additional services. It will also enable ODB to hire a full-time care coordinator who will work closely with the LVN to support guests in navigating the healthcare system.

HSNT is a nonprofit Community Health Center with extensive experience providing primary medical care to people in need, and ODB has over 20 years of experience providing people experiencing homelessness with shelter, meals, and support services. This collaboration is a mission match, as both organizations are dedicated to improving the lives of vulnerable individuals.

### **Program Milestones**





- Navigate 300 quests at Our Daily Bread to appropriate medical services by hiring a LVN and Care Navigator, with at least half adopting HSNT as their medical home.
- Decrease emergency medical services transportation to local emergency departments by 10%.

## Increasing Access, Transforming Lives.

At the grand opening of Our Daily Bread, while on a tour of the new commercial kitchen, a shelter guest required medical attention. The nursing staff was able to treat \$325,000

the man's urgent need and connect him to the clinic at Health Services of North Texas—just two blocks away—for follow up care, rather than having him transported to an Emergency Department. We anticipate a significant decrease in the number of costly transports to local Emergency Departments in the future, as well as an increase in the number of people who can access medical attention on their own when needed.



In a year, approximately 1,200 people experience homelessness in Denton County.




#### **Chronic Homelessness**

NUMBER OF TIMES **HOMELESS IN 3 YEARS** 







Social Determinants of Health that affect people experiencing homelessness



#### **POOR LIVING CONDITIONS**

36% of people experiencing homelessness in Denton County in 2022 were unsheltered.



#### **FOOD INSECURITY**

People experiencing homelessness have limited resources to store and prepare foods safely.



#### **UNEMPLOYMENT**

**50%** of people experiencing homelessness in Denton County are working in some capacity.



#### LACK OF MEDICAL HOME

82% of 9-1-1 calls from Our Daily Bread in 2022 were transported to local Emergency Departments.
