Closing the Gap: A Collaborative Response to Essential Needs in Wise County

About this Grant

Wise County lacks basic infrastructure to manage mental health crises that lead to violence in the home and an unstable community. The jail is the largest mental health provider in Wise County and as a result many people remain untreated until they commit a crime. Bridgeport Police Department, along with Wise County Sheriff's office, will develop a Mental Health Unit composed of both a trained police officer and social worker to specifically respond to those calls and provide supportive resources.

The Children's Advocacy Center for North Texas (CACNT) will develop a Training Institute to equip law enforcement and mental health providers in best practices and educational programs. Local food pantries and school districts will address food insecurity through the expansion of existing programs in local organizations and schools.

Program Milestones

To achieve by December 2024





- Educate teachers and provide services to students in kindergarten through fifth grade about mental health.
- Implement a training program for both law enforcement and mental health providers.
- · Address food insecurity.

Addressing a Gap

Most communities are touched by mental health crises, and those in North Texas are no exception. Locally and nationally, communities face an unprecedented rise in anxiety, depression, family violence, and suicide rates. In the face of those statistics, communities are working to identify innovative approaches to combatting behavioral

health issues and the social determinants of health, including food insecurity, and a lack of employment, healthcare, and transportation, that so often accompany them.

In Wise County, the Closing the Gap grant will create and implement a mental health unit through the Bridgeport Police Department and provide a trauma-informed response to mental health in the cities of Bridgeport and Chico. The grant also supports creating a Training Institute, which will equip law enforcement, educators, mental health providers and other community leaders in the best practices for combatting mental health issues.

"The Children's Advocacy Center for North Texas is very excited about this opportunity to strengthen the skills of our child abuse professionals around the region," said Kristin Howell, CEO of the Children's Advocacy Center, which will develop and lead the Training Institute. "Our departments are growing, and we have seen turnover over the past few years; making training easily accessible is going to help all of us help kids better!" By establishing resources throughout the community, the goal of the grant is to stop mental health crises before they begin.






SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH


The Health Equity Index (HEI)

HEI, formerly, the SocioNeeds Index, incorporates estimates for different social and economic determinants of health that are associated with poor health outcomes.


The Food Insecurity Index (FII)

A measure of food access that is correlated with economic and household hardship.


Percentage of People Living **Below the Poverty Level**

Mental Health Provider Rate for Wise County: 30 per 100,000

Bridgeport Police Department reports over 189 arrests from 2021-2022, including possession, manufacturing and sale of narcotics as well as alcohol. Mental health and substance use disorders are correlated with the disproportionately large number of child abuse and neglect cases, as reported by Ashley Enslow at Children's Advocacy Center for North Texas (CACNT). CACNT has provided over 700 services to families impacted by these cases.
